Summary of Hearings

Submitter 1: Asha Anderson (Flora and Fauna Inc. Society)

- Trustee of the Flora and Fauna Inc. Society, which raised the awareness of the use of chemical toxins.
- Lived in a 'forest sanctuary' near the Puketi forest with an abundance of wildlife and placed great value on the 'beautiful and taonga species' and 'protective of the water that flows through our land'.
- Viewed the Long Term Plan as an opportunity to do things better and 'be genuine'.
- Had previously shared the People's Enquiry Submissions Catalogue which was a collection of stories demonstrating the harms from chemical exposure.
- Concern was raised regarding the unintended consequences of pesticide use on non-target species. Particular reference was made to Brodifacoum, which was readily available and broadly used.
- Reference was also made to a Poisons Register dating back as early as the 1950s.
- Attention was drawn to a number of studies undertaken on hawks, owls, Kiwi, possums,
 Tuatara, pigs and rats which demonstrated the transfer of toxins through the food chain.
- It was stressed that NRC had a role to play and needed to adopt a holistic approach.

Submitter 2: Mr Chris Biddles

- Noted the lengthy process it had taken for the regional council to establish the Regional Sporting Facilities Rate and raised concern that it may cease.
- Stressed that 'we need people to come, live and stay in Northland' and sporting facilities assisted with this (not just in the main centres).
- The economic and social benefits generated from the Regional Sporting Facilities Rate were described as 'tremendous' and the council's contribution helped leverage funding from other providers.

- Concern was raised that the Regional Sporting Facilities Rate had been presented alongside
 the Emergency Services Rate in the consultation material and the proposal had been poorly
 articulated to the public.
- The regional approach to rating with projects being generated through the Northland Sports Facilities plan and the funding collected from a district spent in the same area was considered a successful model.
- While it was acknowledged that Central Government should take responsibility for emergency services it was stressed that they needed to be funded. Mr Biddles was a 'walking example' with the rescue helicopter service potentially saving his life after an accident.
